Members of the Roseville Community,

The past two years have been full of challenges as the pandemic, and civil unrest impacted our department and community. Despite the adversity, I could not be more proud of how our officers and staff continued to serve with the highest level of professionalism and integrity.

The Roseville Police Department remains committed to police accountability and transparency to build trust and legitimacy. We continue to update our transparency and data sharing webpage to provide meaningful data and information about the department and operations. Over the past 18 months, conversations with our Multicultural Advisory Committee have helped shape and improve our policies and practices, to ensure we are meeting the community's expectations.

In 2021, we responded to or initiated 34,980 calls for service. The increase in catalytic converter thefts and stolen autos resulted in the addition of a grant-funded officer dedicated to holding offenders accountable for these crimes. This last year, we rolled out our Community Action Team, a newly formed group of five officers dedicated to working alongside community partners to find innovative solutions to the problems affecting the quality of life of all community members.

On behalf of all of the members of the Roseville Police Department, I thank you for your continued support, and we look forward to continuing to serve our community.



Additional Notable 2021 Highlights

- Met challenges of operating a full-service police department during a worldwide pandemic and social unrest.
- Commenced Ramsey County Attorney's Office "Start by Believing" grant: sexual assault
 detective dedicated to sexual assault investigations; all officers trained in victim-centered
 approach; improved data collection.
- Awarded two MN Department of Commerce Auto Theft Prevention grants, funding specialized equipment and an Auto Theft Specialist with focused efforts on enforcement, investigation, education and outreach.
- Awarded Ramsey County grant to purchase a trailer camera which has been successfully deployed at numerous crime hot spots.
- School Liaison Officer (SLO) organized several Breaking Down Barriers activities with RAHS students to build trust between students and police officers.
- Initiated paid internship program to boost recruitment of non-traditional law enforcement students and enhance victim outreach.
- Received a grant to hire a Housing Navigator to address unsheltered persons of Roseville.

Motor Vehicle Thefts

The rise of motor vehicle thefts has been seen nationwide. In 2021, the Roseville Police Department had over 160 auto theft cases. In June, Officer Nick Olson was assigned to the CAT as an Auto Theft Specialist. The position is grant funded and is dedicated to investigation and prevention of auto theft crimes. To combat this increase in auto theft, the Roseville Police Department implemented several of the following initiatives:

- RVPD Bait Car Program
- Covert Pole Cameras/Camera Trailers
- "Starchase" Pursuit Intervention Technology-Pending Policy Approval

Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts

The theft of motor vehicle parts has taken the nation by storm. In 2021, the Roseville Police Department had 287 theft of motor vehicle parts. In response to the uptick of theft, we hosted 3 Catalytic Converter etching events to help deter would-be thieves. We also have also launched several social media educational campaigns to share theft prevention tips with the community.

Problem Properties

Problem properties have been a pervasive issue for the city. In 2021, we responded to 1,465 calls for service involving problem properties. In partnership with the city council, our repeat nuisance ordinance was revisited and revised to help alleviate calls for service to high utilizing properties.

CAT officer Haivy Vang is the Community Action Team's Problem Property Liason and coordinates with City Code Enforcement and Fire Department personnel to find effective solutions in reducing quality of life problems at locations assigned to. In 2021, CAT assisted RV Code and Fire with numerous Hotel/Motel life and safety inspections throughout the year. These inspections have led to the Fire and Code Departments taking enforcement measures to improve life and safety for guests staying in the hotels.

Mental Health

Mental health calls continue to rise, and we are always looking for better solutions to reduce the high utilization of police services for these calls. In 2021, due to the high number of mental health related calls, we began a partnership with Ramsey County Crisis to implement an Embedded Social Worker Program to develop a long term strategy to assist community members with mental health crises navigate the healthcare system and reduce the impact on police services. We currently have one full time social worker, Nicole Paradise, in house who handles all mental health referrals. In the Spring of 2022, we are expecting to have another join our team full time in the very near future. We also continue to maintain a strong relationship with Northeast Youth & Family Services to provide community-based and trauma informed mental health resources. Additionally, the department was selected as a site to host an AmeriCorps Housing Resource Navigator, Cari McCollor, who has been supporting individuals and families experiencing homelessness since August 2021.



RPD WELCOMES 2 PATROL K9S

Longtime friends, Hugh and Julie Thibodeau, donated \$18,000 to the Roseville Police Foundation to support the Roseville Police Department's police K-9 program. The police department received unanticipated news both police K-9 officers, Jagr and Ragnar, needed to retire by the end of November 2020. The Roseville Police Foundation and Thibodeau family agreed to use the \$18,000 donation to cover the cost of purchasing two police canines. The Roseville Police Foundation donated an additional \$1,000 to support the purchase of the canines. Thank you to the Thibodeau family and Roseville Police Foundation for your generous donation. We are incredibly grateful for the tremendous community support of a vital program.



OFFICER MITCH CHRISTENSEN AND K9 CAL
