# Path to Implementation Community Update #2

# **May 11 Community Meeting Summary**

Sixty-five Roseville residents gathered on May 11 to learn the preliminary findings from the recently conducted Parks & Recreation Interest and Opinion Survey. Graphs prepared by Leisure Vision, a national market and research firm, provided raw data from 500 completed surveys. Final survey findings are scheduled to be presented to the Roseville City Council and Roseville Parks and Recreation Commission **on Monday, June 20th.** The final report will be presented by Leisure Vision staff and include the findings from a minimum of 600 completed surveys that proportionately represent the four community sectors identified in the Master Plan. The final report will also provide valuable information from cross-tabulations that link interests, priorities and funding support.

Jim Stark and Jason Etten (Roseville Residents and Master Plan Implementation Citizen Organizing Team Members) shared their thoughts on the preliminary information and led a community conversation on the findings. Early survey messages include:

- 90% of survey participants had visited at least one Roseville Park in the past 12 months. The national average, is 72% of survey participants visit a local park within a 12 month time period.
- 95% of survey participants rated the physical condition of all parks visited as good or excellent.
- Trails, pathways and community connections continue to be a priority.

The Community Meeting also included an opportunity for attendees to meet with individual work groups to discuss group activitites to date, future projects and topic specific brainstorming.

# **Finance & Communications Work Group**

The group met in April to discuss a variety of funding options and communications strategies. Significant time was spent discussing the benefits and potential support for a local sales tax to support parks and recreation. In casual conversations with community members, the work group has found support for this funding option. The work group will research grant opportunities for projects and development benefitting the Nature Center, Boardwalk, Natural Resources and the OVAL, to name a few. Another area for consideration is public-private partnerships. In all instances, it is important to consider a combination of funding options, to research successful funding plans for like situations and a strong understanding of local issues.

Communication strategies will kick into high gear with the release of the final outcomes from the parks and recreation survey. The work group recommended utilizing electronic communications and social media as much as possible and the value of direct connections either through word of mouth or direct calling. The master plan newsletter has been well received and a good way to present current information.



# **Constellation Reprepresentatives Work Group**

The constellation group met in April. There was brief review of the constellation map and the Master Plan. We also discussed the importance of having a clear and focused message including talking points and a written "blurb" to be distributed to neighborhood publications. Now we anxiously await feedback from the survey. 

#### **Community Organizations & Facilities Work Group** Citizen Lead: Bill Farmer, Gale Pederson





A recent Work Group meeting was dedicated to bringing the team up to speed on the recently completed Master Plan and the current Implementation Process. This meeting also involved an open discussion that resulted in three themes; "how will this personally effect me?", what is the level of collaboration between parks and recreation and other partners (mainly ISD 623), and a community center.



Survey findings will provide direction for future discussions and activity.



### **Implementation Partners Work Group**

The Implementation Partners Work Group continues to explore opportunities to join others in the community to maximize our resources and potential. Roseville Parks and Recreation has a long history of working with Ramsey County, local school districts, the watershed districts, neighboring communities and civic organizations. More detailed efforts will be developed following the release of survey findings and the sharing of ideas and strategies with other Master Plan Work Groups.

Natural Resources and Trails has explored a number of areas of interest benefitting the Parks and Recreation System.

### **Natural Resource Management**

Ongoing natural resource management activities that are incorporated into annual maintenance or park improvement programs. This would be a new program within the Parks and Recreation Department. Program activities would be limited to annual maintenance or park improvement funding. Program development would identify specific tasks to be undertaken as funding allows. Citizen engagement would be incorporated into routine program implementation and evaluation. Programs could involve everything from invasive species to wildlife management to tree disease management to water quality and stormwater management, to name a few.

### **Community Outreach**

Natural Resource Management outreach efforts might include; public engagement through the network of neighborhood and constellation parks, community hiking club, park clean up events, and natural resources education and enrichment programs.

### **Projects**

Possible projects carried out similar to the current capital improvement program. The Master Plan identifies replacement of the nature center boardwalk, developing wild areas in sectors, constellations and neighborhood parks across the city, signage and interpretive infrastructure, restoration of reservoir and Reservoir Woods park and other recommendation from the 2002 Natural Resource Management plan as appropriate.

#### **Trails and Pathways**

Involves efforts to improve pedestrian connectivity between neighborhoods and parks including; trails/routes connecting parks and neighborhoods, trails in Southwest Roseville, coordinate efforts with the Pathway Master Plan and Ramsey County.

# Coming to a Roseville Park near you ... the 2011 Master Plan Constellation Tour ~ June 22 - August 17

In the recently completed Parks and Recreation Survey, 90% responded to having used a Roseville park in the past 12 months - the national average is 72%. Roseville is a community that enjoys its Parks System and Recreation opportunities. This summer Parks and Recreation Commissioners, Constellation Work Group Representatives and Parks and Recreation Staff will visit 15 different parks (one in each "constellation") to bring the recreation experience to local neighborhoods and meet first-hand with residents to keep people informed on current Master Plan activities and gauge their interest and support of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan Implementation.
